THE COURSE

The purpose of RGTR 0198 is to teach students effective and efficient strategies that will improve their academic success on the Regents' Reading Test.

RGTR 0198, *Regents' Reading Test Prep*, is a two credit, pass/fail course that does not affect GPA. Passing the course enables the student to take the Reading portion of the Regents' Test. Failure to pass the course means that not only will the student be denied admittance to the Reading portion of the Regents' Test in the current semester, but also that the student will automatically be enrolled in RGTR 0198 in subsequent semesters until the course is passed.

ATTENDANCE AND TARDY POLICY

Regular class attendance is important because daily class will provide opportunities to practice new skills. All absences count the same regardless of the reason for the absence. There is no such thing as an "excused absence." Only one absence is allowed. Students with 3 (three) absences will be automatically dropped from the course and will receive a U.

"Tardies" are disruptive to instruction; therefore, it is important for you to arrive on time. Please note that two "tardies" equal one absence. Students who arrive more than 10 minutes after the start of class will be counted as absent for that day.

READINESS

Please bring your textbook, schedule book, lexicon, pencils, and other necessary materials to class every day. This will allow for you to participate fully in our discussion.

ACADEMIC DISHONESTY POLICY
