

ABOUT THE AUTHOR:

Robert E. Stipe is Professor Emeritus of Design in the landscape architecture program at the School of Design, North Carolina State University in Raleigh, North Carolina. Trained in the fields of economics, law, and urban planning, he has for the last 45 years been principally concerned with the legal and governmental aspects of amenity planning in general and with historic preservation in particular. He served as a member of the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee of the American National Trust for Historic Preservation, and is a former State Historic Preservation Officer for North Carolina. Professor Stipe has been active in a variety of conservation and preservation endeavors which range from the Historic District Commission and Design Review Board in his hometown of Chapel Hill, to the international programs of US/ICOMOS, of which he is a Fellow and former member of its Board of Trustees.

The draftsman of many state and local preservation statutes and ordinances, Professor Stipe received the U.S. Secretary of the Interior's Distinguished Conservation Service Award in 1978; the Ruth Coltrane Cannon Award from the North Carolina Association for the Preservation of Antiquities in 1973; and the Louise DuPont Crowninshield Award from the National Trust for Historic Preservation in 1989. In 1968-1969 he was a Senior Fulbright Research Fellow at the University of London investigating problems of historic preservation, amenity planning, and countryside conservation in England. His teaching experience includes courses in planning law, community design policy, historic preservation planning and law, and the legal aspects of landscape conservation.

Professor Stipe was an early NAPC board member and has contributed several articles to *The Alliance Review*. He continues to serve the organization and preservation field with his experience, responsive advice, and generosity.
