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This course introduces you to the science of psychology. The focus is on psychology's contribution to the understanding of mind, brain, and behavior. Topics include the history of psychology, research methods, behavioral neuroscience, perception, development, learning, memory, cognition, language, intelligence, consciousness, motivation, emotions, social psychology, personality, and psychopathology. The emphasis is on identifying principles that govern behavior and experience through scientific investigation.

### Expectations

You are expected to be prepared for class (i.e., read the assigned chapter) and attend class. As part of the overall educational experience of the course, *you are required to complete 6.5 hours of participation in research activities during the semester*. You can earn up to a 3% bonus this semester if you complete 3 extra hours of research participation; to be eligible for the bonus, you must first complete the required 6.5 hours plus the extra hours during this semester (i.e., you cannot earn the bonus *after* receiving a grade or an incomplete during this semester).

*Each exam will evaluate information from the text and material presented in class. Consequently, it is necessary for you to read the textbook and attend lectures.* Exams 1–6 will be held in class during regular course meeting times. The final exam will be held at the time designated by the University. Exams 1-6 are non-cumulative. The final exam is cumulative. See Course Schedule (below) for details. The course syllabus is a general plan for the course; deviations announced to the class by the instructor may be necessary.

### Exam Policy

Six exams will be administered during regularly scheduled classes (see Course Schedule below). For each student, only your four highest exam scores (out of the six exams) will be counted for your final grade. Your two lowest exam scores will automatically be dropped. If you miss an exam, a zero score will be assigned for your score on that exam (which may be dropped if it is one of your lowest scores). *Regardless of the reasons for your missing an exam, there will be no make-up exams.* The four highest exam scores will determine 80% of your final grade (i.e., the top four scores will be averaged with equal weight – each is worth 20% of the final grade). The final examination will determine 20% of your final grade. Final course grades are: A+: >= 93; A-: 90-<93; B+: 87-<90; B: 83-<87; B-: 80-<83; C+77-<80; C:73-<77; C-: 70-<73; D+: 67-<70; D: 63-<67; D-: 60-<63; F < 60.
